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SH:1 – Apostolic Age — Q/A

- 1) This evangelist was a companion and secretary of St. Peter and served as Bishop of Alexandria. His symbol is a winged lion.
- 2) This apostle preached in Parthia and Persia and is thought to have traveled as far as India on his missionary journeys.
- 3) This Apostolic Father, a disciple of St. John, is known for seven letters written on his way to martyrdom that reveal early Christian beliefs and piety.
- 4) This evangelist was author of a gospel and also the Acts of the Apostles. He was a physician and a traveling companion of St. Paul.
- 5) At this council, attended by the apostles Peter and Paul, it was decided that gentile converts to Christianity did not have to keep the law of Moses.
- 6) Jesus Christ was executed by the Roman governor Pontius Pilate under the reign of this Roman Emperor.
- 7) This magician offered the apostles money in order to purchase the power of the Holy Spirit, giving his name to the sin of selling spiritual gifts.
- 8) The apostles Peter and Paul were both martyred in Rome around the year 67 at the direction of this Emperor.
- 9) This Apostle was a companion of Philip. He is thought to have traveled on missionary journeys in the east and brought Christianity to Armenia.
- 10) According to tradition, this is the way Peter died.
- 11) St. Paul was blinded by a ray of radiant light while on his way to this city. After his sight was restored he was filled with zeal for the faith.

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- 12) This event is said to mark the establishment of the Roman Catholic Church.
- 13) This penitent thief who was crucified along side our lord is the patron of persons condemned to death.
- 14) This apostle was the brother of James the Lesser, the author of the second to last book of the Bible, and is the patron saint of desperate causes.
- 15) St. Paul started his first and third missionary journeys from this center of Christian evangelism.
- 16) Soon after the crucifixion and resurrection, this disciple was elected to replace Judas Iscariot as one of the twelve.
- 17) In the Gospel of John, the Apostle Bartholomew is referred to by this name.
- 18) This apostle, who was present during the miracle of the loaves and fishes, is symbolized by loaves of bread.
- 19) This saint was declared patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX. Saint Joseph
- 20) This is the symbol of the Apostle Paul.
- 21) This is a symbol of Matthew the Apostle, who gave up his job as a tax-collector to follow Jesus.
- 22) A pair of keys is a symbol of St. Peter in his role as the first Pope. This is another symbol that represents Peter, but NOT the Papacy.
- 23) This is the symbol of Andrew the Apostle, patron saint of Scotland and Russia.
- 24) These were the parents of St. John the Baptist.
