

## WT:8 – Liturgical Languages — Q/A

*Recommended Reading: A Primer for Ecclesiastical Latin and Traditional Roman Missals.*

- 1) This Christian saint name comes from two Latin words which mean "true image".
- 2) This is the meaning of the phrase "Mea Culpa" from the penitential prayer before the altar.
- 3) This is the Latin term for the whole Christian Church and things related to it.
- 4) This is the meaning of the Latin word 'traditio', from which we get the English word 'Tradition.'
- 5) The earliest manuscripts of most of the books of the New Testament were written and distributed in this language.
- 6) St. Jerome produced this canonical Latin translation of the Bible from both Greek and Hebrew sources in the 4th century.
- 7) This Greek word means manifestation or appearance, especially the appearance of a divine being.
- 8) The literal meaning of this Greek word, describing a heresy of the 8th century, is "one who breaks images".
- 9) This is the meaning of the Greek word "martyr."
- 10) This Hebrew greeting meaning "Peace be with you" was used as a greeting by Jesus several times in the Gospels.
- 11) "Amen" in Hebrew means this.
- 12) This Semitic language was the native tongue of Jesus and his disciples.

- 13) This is the meaning of "Panis Angelicus", the name of one of Thomas Aquinas's most beautiful Eucharistic hymns.
- 14) This hymn, whose title means "Rejoice" is the name of an ancient Latin Christmas carol, often sung during lent.
- 15) This term, meaning "from the chair" of St. Peter, is used when referring to the pope's authoritative statements regarding Catholic faith and morals.
- 16) This Latin phrase, meaning "By this sign you will conquer", is famous due to a vision of Constantine before the Battle of Milvian Bridge (312 A.D.).
- 17) These this is the meaning of the Latin phrase "Anaethema sit" (often written as A.S.).
- 18) This is the meaning of "Fiat Lux", the first phrase spoken by God in the Bible.
- 19) This is the Latin version of the prayer "Grant us Peace".
- 20) This is the meaning of the prayer "Confiteor" said during the Penance or during prayers at the beginning of Mass.
- 21) This is literal meaning of the word "Paraclete", often used to describe the Holy Spirit.
- 22) The word 'malus' in Latin means evil, but it can also be translated to mean this type of food.
- 23) This Latin term, meaning "entrance" refers to the opening prayer or antiphon that precedes the first reading during mass.
- 24) This is the meaning of the Latin word "Acedia", one of the seven deadly sins.
- 25) These are the Latin terms for Faith, Hope, and Charity.
