

WT:1 – Signs and Symbols — Q/A

- 1) The liturgical color red represents love and blood and is always used on these feast days.
- 2) This distinctive version of a cross features a ring or circle surrounding the crux of a Latin cross, and was popular in medieval Ireland.
- 3) These symbols and emblems are associated with the Papacy.
- 4) Fire, wind, water, and a dove are all symbols of this.
- 5) This animal, valued for its industry and sweetness, is a symbol of saints Ambrose, Bernard, Isidore of Seville, and John Chrysostom.
- 6) This animal symbol can be used to represent those condemned at the last judgment those possessed by demonic forces.
- 7) This animal is associated with the Hebrew tribe of Judah and is also a symbol of St. Jerome and Mark the Evangelist.
- 8) This animal is frequently used to represent Christ and his ascension into heaven, and is also the symbol of John the Evangelist.
- 9) These are symbols of a bishop.
- 10) These letters from the Greek alphabet form a monogram from the first letters of Christ's name that is one of the oldest symbols of Christianity.
- 11) This Christogram is formed from the first few letters of the Greek word for Jesus.
- 12) By order of Pilate, the four letters I.N.R.I. were placed on Christ's Cross and they stand for this.

- 13) This style of cross, in common use by the fourth century, has four arms of equal length.
- 14) This is used to signal the election of a new pope to the faithful waiting outside.
- 15) This flower, often used to adorn churches during Easter, is a symbol of both the Virgin Mary and also the resurrection.
- 16) This plant, a pagan symbol of victory, was adopted by Christianity to symbolized Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem and the victory of martyrs.
- 17) These symbols are often used to represent the three theological virtues of faith, hope, and charity.
- 18) These are symbols and emblems associated with St. Peter, the first pope.
- 19) This is a short rectangular piece of white cloth, worn beneath the alb to cover the shoulders with two ends tied at the waist of the priest.
- 20) This is the outer vestment of a priest celebrating the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.
- 21) These are the colors of the papal flag.
- 22) This fire, representing the risen Christ, is lit during the Easter Vigil and extinguished at the feast of the Ascension.
- 23) Engraved with a picture of St. Peter and the name of the present pontiff, it is used to seal briefs and is destroyed on the death of a pope.
- 24) This six pointed star, formed from two interlocking triangles, has been adopted as a Jewish symbol and is now prominent on the flag of Israel.
